

Itinerary

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 $(\boldsymbol{\Sigma})$ SOCORRO BEACH START

> At the Guindaste crossing we go through the tunnel and cross the road to take the path next to the signpost.

Ne start off our hike at sea level. We take the road that leads us to the TF-5 main road and we ascend up to the first road crossing.

We climb to the upper part of the ridge from where we then descend to "camino de la Cueva" and then continue ascending to "calle Tigotán".

4 At the intersection we turn left and walk until we reach the intersection with "camino de las Piedras" to the right. Then we go up and left to "calle Tigaiga".

Here we turn right and begin the ascent to "camino de las Vueltas."

6 For more than a kilometre we walk up a winding, stone paved path until we reach the TF-342 main road.


We turn right onto the walkway along the side of the road in direction of the El Lance lookout.

After passing through the inhabited part we reach an agricultural area where we will find the path that will take us to the lookout of "La



We remain on this path until we reach the Asomadero outlook. We have to be careful because terrain is steep and the ground can be slippery.

A few metres further on we get

to a crossroads where we keep


ascending along the main trail.

We cross an area of shrubland and pine forest with several intersections that we ignore. We reach an area known as "Piedra de los Pastores" (Shepherds' Stone) and continue along the main trail.

We continue along the trail from the previous junction. Once we cross the barrier we continue along the main trail that curves to the left and then we take the trail that continues to the right. We don't leave the trail until we reach the base of the "Fortaleza" cliff. Once we get there we do a short descent onto the plain.

At the end of trail 22 we connect with trail number 6 in the area of "Montaña de Los Conejos" (Rabbits' Mountain) that also belong to the network of trails of the National Park. Further along we switch onto trail number 7 that will take us to the summit.

Trail 7 ends here and we walk left onto the Telesforo Bravo trail that will take us to the summit. This trail can only be used with a special permit that has to be applied for before hand at the National Park's offices..

The summit is the mid point of Route 040. From here, at 3.715 metres above sea level, on a clear day you can see all seven islands and large part of the island of Tenerife.

Once arrived at the summit, the return journey is along the same route, in the opposite direction.


Halfway along the trail from "Montaña Blanca" we arrive at the Altavista refuge where we can rest before we continue to "La Rambleta"

Tenerife's route 040 is an adventurous trail that reaches the summit of mount Teide, starting from the shore of Socorro beach in the municipality of Los Realejos and returning on the same path until one has once again set foot on the volcanic sand of the beach.

It is the trail with the largest drop in Spain, with around 7,600 meters of accumulated drop in total and 54 kilometres of alpine trail that makes Tenerife attractive for its extreme challenges.

For experienced runners and properly trained athletes, the route is considered a challenge that can be completed in a single day. For those less prepared in this type of tests, it is recommended to enjoy the route in several stages, more comfortably and with equal satisfaction.

In addition, the climatic conditions of the island allow this trail to be done during much of the year, except in winter when Teide is often covered with snow.



FLORA AND FAUNA

The trajectory of Route 040 takes us into protected natural reserves such as the Rambla de Castro, Tigaiga, Campeches and Ruiz, the Corona Forestal and the Teide National Park, where we can get to know first hand the wealth of the ecosystems and altitudinal zones of the north side of the island of Tenerife.

The rich biodiversity is evident in the multitude of plant and animal species that live in these places, especially on the slopes of Tigaiga, which reach from the cliffs on the coast to El Cabezón in the Teide National Park, where

we find authentic relics of our natural heritage.

We can find many species of flora along the whole trail: the palm groves of the coast, the striking dragon trees, the shrublands and laurel forests, the extensive pine woods and broom bushes on the summits. Here we can find the Tenerife blue chaffinch, the laurel pigeon and Bolle's pigeon, the blackcap as well as a rich invertebrate fauna.
